

ITAL-3043. Italian Cinema

This course explores the history and evolution of Italian cinema from the silent era to the present day. Students will analyze key films and directors, focusing on themes such as social realism, neorealism, and the New Wave. The course includes screenings of classic and contemporary Italian films, as well as readings of critical essays and film theory. Prerequisites: ITAL 1013 and ITAL 2103.

Latin**LATI-1013. Introduction to Latin I**

This course provides a comprehensive introduction to Latin grammar and vocabulary. Students will learn to read and understand Latin texts, focusing on the works of Cicero and Virgil. The course includes grammar exercises, reading assignments, and a final exam. Prerequisites: None.

LATI-1023. Introduction to Latin II

This course continues the study of Latin grammar and vocabulary, focusing on the works of Tacitus and Suetonius. Students will learn to read and understand Latin texts, focusing on the works of Tacitus and Suetonius. Prerequisites: LATI 1013 and ITAL 1013.

LATI-2103. Latin III (Intermediate)

This course continues the study of Latin grammar and vocabulary, focusing on the works of Pliny the Younger and Seneca. Students will learn to read and understand Latin texts, focusing on the works of Pliny the Younger and Seneca. Prerequisites: LATI 1023, ITAL 1023, and ITAL 2103.

LATI-3103. Latin IV (Intermediate)

This course continues the study of Latin grammar and vocabulary, focusing on the works of Augustine and Jerome. Students will learn to read and understand Latin texts, focusing on the works of Augustine and Jerome. Prerequisites: LATI 2103, ITAL 2103, and ITAL 3103.

Romance Languages**ROML-2013. Introduction to Linguistics I**

This course introduces students to the field of linguistics, focusing on the structure and function of language. Students will learn about the phonetic, morphological, and syntactic aspects of language, as well as the historical development of the Romance languages. Prerequisites: None.

ROML-2023. Introduction to Linguistics II

This course continues the study of linguistics, focusing on the semantics and pragmatics of language. Students will learn about the meaning and use of language in different contexts, as well as the historical development of the Romance languages. Prerequisites: ROML 2013 and ITAL 1013.
